6. Suppose that $S$ is a set of vectors, $S \subseteq \mathbb{C}^{m}$. Prove that if $\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{y} \in\langle S\rangle$, then $\mathbf{x}+\mathbf{y} \in\langle S\rangle$. (15 points)
